The award, worth R1000, goes towards paying the fee for the final-year exams, the Cambridge Overseas School Certificate (the current body for the GCSE exams in Lesotho). Majobile will be taking her GCSEs next year.

On top of the basic school fees, the COSC exam fees present another hurdle for students at high school. Many families find it difficult enough to

find the money for the basic school fees, let alone for the extra exam fees. The overall burden of fees in the final year of high school is almost double that of other years.

At present the annual award is only open to those girls who are already getting support from Educare. We hope this award will inspire girls to do well in their Junior Certificate exams in the future.

#### School results 2005



Both our year-three students have passed their Junior Certificate and are going into the penultimate high school year. The best results were achieved by 'Majobile Mpata, who attained a first class pass.We take pride in working in partnership with such brilliance.

Four new girls joined the Educare scheme this year. Three are in their first year of high school: Lineo Teko, Limpho Masunyane and Lineo Qomu. The other, Teboho Tjakata, is in her penultimate year. According to her school principal, she would have no chance of finishing her studies without extra help. Hers is not a unique story.

We include some of the letters we have received from school principals. They state the case for the young women much more clearly than we could ever do.

## Letter to all the Educare girls

This is an open letter from Educare to all the young women who have done us the honour of accepting our support.

Bo-ausi,

Thank you for all your letters over the years, keeping us informed about your progress at school, your future dreams and any problems you have. We very much appreciate hearing from you.

On behalf of the committee and all the supporters of Educare, we'd like to take this opportunity to let you know that the support we provide is given freely and is not intended to make you feel in any way beholden to anyone. The best way you can show your appreciation of our efforts is for you to put all your energies into your studies. If you are successful, perhaps in the future you in your turn will be in a position to support someone else.

Once you have been accepted onto the Educare scheme, your award will be paid every year until you finish high school, as long as you keep up the good work and continue to get good results. So you can relax, enjoy your school days and concentrate on your studies.

At the end of each year, your school will be asked to report on your progress and confirm that you are still attending. You should check that this information has been sent to Educare, to ensure that your award is renewed for the following year. Without the information, we will not know whether you are still at the school and still needing our support. A short letter from you would also be very much appreciated.

Many of our supporters are not from Africa and are curious about Lesotho. So we'd be grateful if your letters included information about your country, what living there is like, and what makes it a special place for you. Who knows: your letters may help inspire some people to come and visit.
